The show with the unloved compère

The show was great, from getting off the bus to getting back on again was great. We were locked out but Charlie made them

The atmosphere before the show was fantastic. Dave was very quick off the mark & started the traditional balloon chain around the theatre which was quite a sight. There were also many balloons flying around & a salvo of paper planes launched from the top tier to the bottom.

The TWJC contingent managed to get a top tier viewpoint for the fantastic show hosted by **Rod Laver** who I recall as the astounding Ping-Pong ball juggler from Nottingham.

Wilson who did some beautifully choreographed ring juggling & manipulation with some very nice silver rings which flashed in the light. He ended juggling 7 inside a circle of rings spinning on the floor, which looked superb.

Yuron from Israel did some nice 3-ball juggling; I particularly liked his trick where the balls rolled down his arms to bounce off the floor & back into the pattern.

The club juggler whose name escapes me (**Toby** according to some people on the net) was nothing short of breath taking. His juggling was millimetre perfect, his most stunning trick for me was the one where he bounced a ball on his head, while

juggling 4 clubs, then he went into triple singles & did a helicopter spin across his head underneath the bouncing ball! Wow!

The Swedish topless diaboloist (say that with a mouthful of peanuts) from the Circomedia/Circuspace show did his surreal rolling across the floor bit again & the very graceful French club juggler (Cecile apparently) also won a place in the public show with her routine.

Ben Jennings performed a contact juggling routine around a candle lit altar type thing, which created a nice effect of golden flames inside his crystal balls. It was good but I expected much more from the routine.

A guy from Channel 5 came on & did a mime routine based on the mask. It included some interesting touches, but for me it wasn't as good as the act that Richard Vobes performed at the Royal Tunbridge Wells juggling Festival.

Wots'its Face (see what happens when you don't have a program or a copy of The Catch) did a very cool devilstick routine with some highly impressive leg maneuvers.

'The former best juggler in the world' **Greg Kennedy** performed a stunning bounce juggling routine using a 'V' shaped apparatus (which was at 90° otherwise Bryn gets upset) which caused a vertically dropped ball to bounce twice & come up on the other side. 5 balls certainly looked impressive.

Ben Jennings & Greg Kennedy later joined forces to move this bizarre construction of white tubes which could be moved & twisted to make all sorts of interesting shapes. There was no skill involved, just walking around & moving the struts about. It certainly was not juggling. I preferred the spoof version done with a cube made from modeling balloons during Renegade.

'Old Blue Eyes' himself AKA **Haggis Mc leod** performed a nice hat routine which was a bit better than Mark Greasley's act last year.

The best act by far though was the first routine from The Gandini Juggling Project. It was simply 5 jugglers all with 3 clubs. The only tricks that they did were double spins, a bit of passing & the 'bat spin' trick (throw a club & bat the body so that it doesn't complete a spin), there was nothing fancy at all but it was an audio routine much more than it was visual. The sound of all 5 jugglers catching in unison & stamping bare foot on the stage plus the couple of tricks described earlier in various combinations produced some fantastic rhythms

which were all performed with clinical precision.

The second act from the show 'Remembering Rastelli' by The Gandini Juggling Project finished off the show with the whole troupe juggling balls & rings. The routine was very well put together in that the skills & fluidity of movement were very good but it was far too busy. At any one point in the show there was always far too much going on to take in, I found myself just watching Jay Gilligan & whoever was around him at the time. They performed many intricate passing & multi person patterns such as 4ball mill's Mess between 3 people at times with carrying & placing variations by a fourth member of the group. All very clever stuff but a bit too intense. The musical score was terrible too.

Big Brother is watching you

It has come to our attention that certain people have been a little 'absent minded' in paying their entrance fees on club nights. This is a very serious matter; we rely on your honesty & the money you pay to keep the club going. No money = No club (no staples even).


So where are the pictures?


The problem was that I had so many photos that I didn't know what to do with them all, in the end I decided to create a nice little picture gallery at the back of this newsletter.
